

4 Annotations in MLA on Education Subject - Annotated Bibliography Guide

Annotations are short summaries of academic sources with all of your key points clearly outlined. Having your annotations ready beforehand significantly facilitates you in research writing, and having annotations prepared allows you to refer back to the central context of your source any time you want.

In academic documents, there are multiple citation styles that are commonly followed, including MLA, APA, AMA, CHICAGO, HARVARD, etc. The formatting of an annotated bibliography also varies depending upon the citation style which a document is following. However, the central elements of every annotation remain the same.

Annotations mostly range between 100-200 words, depending upon the source length. It is always better to skim your source first before you start annotating. When it comes to writing annotations, there are some elements that every annotation must encompass. Every annotation begins with a bibliographical line at the top. The content includes the name of the source and author, its central thesis, methodology, and finding, followed by relevance to your source.

Adding relevancy of an annotation to your source is important since it makes the credibility of your research. In the following section, you will find some annotated bibliography examples focused on the nursing subject. Note how the components of annotation are arranged in MLA format.

Atteh, Samuel O. "The Crisis in Higher Education in Africa." *Issue: A Journal of Opinion*, vol. 24, no. 1, JSTOR, 1996, pp. 36–42.

Samuel O. Atteh, in his study "The Crisis in Higher Education in Africa," has explored the limitations that have resulted in a repressive growth of African education in parallel to multiple socio-political and economic factors. Highlighting the statistical data from the 1960s onwards, the **essay writer** has conducted a qualitative analysis to approach the problem through historical and political context. The findings proved that the colonization of Africa, followed by the exploitation of economic resources, gave the region a push-back in all social spheres.

Geiger, Roger. "Impact of the Financial Crisis on Higher Education in the United States." *International Higher Education*, no. 59, 2010.

Roger Geiger, in his research "Impact of the Financial Crisis on Higher Education in the United States," has explored the relationship between the quality of higher education and the economic crisis of 2008. Through a quantitative analysis, Geiger explored how the shortfall of revenue and state funding resulted in the unenrollment of multiple employees. The writer also highlighted how the prolonged economic crisis could influence the quality and availability of higher education to students coming from low-income families.

Maringe, Felix. "Interrogating the Crisis in Higher Education Marketing: The CORD Model." *International Journal of Educational Management*, Emerald Group Publishing Limited, 2005.

Felix Maringe, in "Interrogating the Crisis in Higher Education Marketing: The CORD Model," has explored the educational crisis at three different frontiers, including the state economic difference, the incompetence of the business sector in establishing the market followed by lack of domestication of HE. Incorporating the CORD model, the findings using national and regional surveys concluded that the only way out for universities from the crisis is to propose a centralized business plan by adopting the proposed curriculum-centered marketing mode and have [professional essay writing service](#)

Wit, Hans de, and Philip Altbach. "The Syrian Refugee Crisis and Higher Education." *International Higher Education*, no. 84, 2016, pp. 9–10.

Hans de Wit and Philip Altbach, in their study "The Syrian Refugee Crisis and Higher Education," have highlighted the pertaining issue of the rising refugee population in America and

the challenges it imposes in the educational sector. The author argued that opportunities must be provided to the competent refugees to score higher education since they hold the potential to bring immense contribution to the country.
